

CURT'S CORNER

Here we are. After six weeks of staying away from our church building, schools, and many public gatherings, we look to the future with many questions. How long with this COVID-19 pandemic last? What effects will it have on our families? Will our economy recover? For many years, unlike many of our sisters and brothers across the globe, we've been blessed to live in a fairly safe environment: food has been available, jobs have been secure, and life has been fairly predictable.

It strikes me that the world that Jesus entered 2,000 years looked a lot more like our current COVID-19 world than the world we lived in three months ago. Jesus grew up in a militarized zone - Israel was occupied by Rome. The Roman occupation was oppressive: taxes were incredibly high. Many people lived day-to-day; they wondered where their next meal might come from. Fearful for their futures, many of them also wondered when war might strike their village again.

When you find yourself in an unstable world, your self-preservation instinct seems to automatically kick in. You've probably felt that over the past six weeks. I have. Our tendency is to think about everything we can do to safeguard ourselves and our families. We tend to focus on one thing: ourselves.

But it's interesting. As Jesus ministered in a world of uncertainty, he taught people to do something different. In Matthew 5:31-33, Jesus puts it bluntly: "So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

When Jesus entered into a world of uncertainty, his teachings undoubtedly seemed counterintuitive. Don't focus on yourself. Practice hospitality. Let go of your anger. Forgive. Love your neighbor. Love your enemy.

I wonder if the teachings of Jesus may be more relevant to us than ever before. Because Jesus taught these things in a world of uncertainty much like the COVID-19 world we're living in now. In a world where everything that we're used to has vanished, Christ-followers are discovering once again that the teachings of Jesus provide the surest foundation for our lives. We've just finished the first half of our "How Firm a Foundation: Biblical Guidance for the Questions Everyone's Asking" sermon series. Each Sunday, services are emailed to you and posted on Youtube and Facebook. We hope they'll encourage you to consider the ways of living that Jesus says offer us a strong foundation.

Each week, we're also sending out a Scripture Reading guide. It has verses

While not nearly as effective as the N-95 masks for preventing someone from catching COVID -19, they are effective at keeping a sick person from spreading COVID -19. Giving a sick patient a homemade mask helps clinics save the medical grade masks for the health care providers.
